In other words, it is formed like this: Add "ed" to most verbs: jump > jumped paint > painted If a verb of one syllable ends [consonant-vowel-consonant], double the final consonant and add "ed": chat > chatted stop > stopped If the final consonant is "w," "x," or "y," don't double it: sew > sewed play > played fix > fixed If last syllable of a longer verb is stressed and ends [consonant-vowel-consonant], double the last consonant and add "ed": incur > incurred prefer > preferred If the first syllable of a longer verb is stressed and the verb ends [consonant-vowel-consonant], just add "ed": open > opened enter > entered swallow > swallowed If the verb ends "e," just add "d": thrive > thrived Guzzle > guzzled If the verb ends [consonant + "y"], change the "y" to an "i" and add "ed": If it's an irregular verb, the "past participle" is formed in all sorts of different ways.
