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The Christmas season is here, which probably means many of your speech therapy students are abuzz with excitement. This enthusiasm provides a wonderful opportunity to bring some festivity into your speech therapy sessions with these fun (and FREE) Christmas-themed activities. This Christmas-themed fill-in-the-blanks story is instant laughter. Students identify nouns, verbs, etc. that complete the narrative about Christmas gifts. Actually, the story isn't specific to Christmas gifts, so you can use it to discuss gift-giving for any holiday. The activity is perfect for targeting language goals, and you can easily hone in on specific articulation targets with sound-loaded word lists. This activity is great for using a Christmas theme with older students, a session warm-up, virtual or in-person therapy, and working on abstract language. You can even play a clip of each song once it's guessed and/or have students come up with some of their own. Speaking of Christmas songs, you can also use lyrics to identify words with any target sound. Highlight the words or use digital annotation (if in teletherapy or using a device). Then have each student practice saying (or singing!) the words by themselves or in phrases or sentences. Bring the fun of a traditional game... Christmas style! Here are a few ideas: Print Christmas charade cards (like these from One Simple Party) and have students act out activities like having a snowball fight or decorating a tree. And just because the game involves silent motions, doesn't mean there isn't language involved use past tense and description to talk about what the person did! Similar to Pictionary, you can have students draw Christmas-themed items for others to guess. Create a list of holiday items (or use this list from The Game Gal) for students to choose from. Use this list of "Taboo" style cards (from theholidayzone.com) to have students describe Christmas objects without saying specified words. Use this free Christmas lights scavenger hunt with any YouTube video, books, or pictures. You and your students will find so many language opportunities as you look for various lights and decorations. The Melissa and Doug website hosts several free Christmas activities that you can print and use to target many goals. Some of my favorites (that especially lend themselves to speech therapy) include a gift planning list, a Christmas tree picture search, and a Santa's toy shop coloring page. Baamboozle has a lot of pre-made Christmas trivia games, but you can also make your own! In fact, students may enjoy making a trivia game for their peers, including finding photos or gifts to go with each question. Students can work cooperatively to decorate the speech room for Christmas. One easy way is to make paper chains with any speech or language target. For example, students could write an articulation word on each strip of paper. There are (probably literally) millions of Christmas videos on YouTube... just make sure you screen them first! A few ideas include... Last but not least... books! Search your bookshelf or library for a few children's Christmas books to share with your students and target nearly any speech or language goal. There are many to choose from, but here are a few suggestions: Bear Stays Up for Christmas by Karma Wilson A Not Very Merry Pout-Pout Fish by Deborah Diesen Mooseltoe by Margi Palatinit's Christmas, David! by David Shannon The Crayons' Christmas by Drew Daywalt The Polar Express by Chris Van Allsburg These engaging (and 100% free) Christmas-themed activities can be incorporated into speech therapy sessions to embrace the holiday spirit. From festive games to mind-boggling brain teasers, each one promotes speech and language development in a fun and meaningful way. Happy holidays and happy learning! Those 2-3 weeks in December before school gets out can feel like an eternity. (When is break starting!?) However, it can also be a time to add some fun, Christmas speech therapy activities into your sessions! Christmas Speech Therapy Themes: To get your mind thinking about different possibilities this season, here are some theme ideas: Cookies/Baking Gingerbread (houses or cookies) gifts receiving and giving (see social skills idea below) Reindeer Mail (Letters to Santa or Holiday Cards) Stockings/Christmas trees/pine trees Decorating Hot Cocoa Christmas Speech Therapy Activities: Whether you are looking to add a Christmasy twist to some old favorites (like following directions or WH- Questions) or you want to target some holiday-specific social skills, I've got some ideas for you! Christmas Crafts for Speech Therapy Any craft can be made into a rich language experience. (Tip choose something that is not too challenging for your students so they can focus on the language.) When I worked with students in a substantially separate classroom setting, I found that a lot of crafts were too hard due to challenges with fine motor skills. Gluing with glue sticks was a task that these students were successful with. This Roll-a-Reindeer craft uses gluing and a simple dice game to incorporate early social skills (turn-taking, passing the dice, and speaking to a group). If you are looking for a craft to keep your students hands busy while working on articulation or language goals, you could try this Cookies for Santa craft! The cookies have articulation or language targets on them. Students can practice each target while they color, cut, and then glue to get more trials in! Christmas WH Questions for Speech Therapy Do you feel like you are always targeting WH- Questions? You can shake things up by using some Christmas WH questions with your students! I made these Christmas WH- question cards that include lots of visuals to help your students with comprehension of both the question and of the answer choices. (There are also BOOM Cards version here) I like to use this FREE WH- Types Chart to teach (and prompt) the different types of WH- Questions. RELATED: Using Visuals to Teach WH- Questions Christmas Short Stories with WH Questions Looking for slightly more challenging WH- questions? These Christmas short stories (about a paragraph long) are perfect for students working on differentiation between WH question types or for students working on auditory comprehension or memory recall. This set includes three levels of support. Level 1: Includes multiple choices with pictures. Students can cut and paste the answers. Level 2: Includes written multiple choices. Students can cut and paste the answers. Level 3: Students write-in their answers to the WH questions. Christmas Social Skills Activity Social skills around gifts can be tricky for students on the autism spectrum. A fun Christmas social skills group activity is to practice opening a bad present. You can set this up by wrapping a few presents in boxes with lids and in gift bags (not in wrapping paper) so that they can be used repeatedly. You can put in something silly or just something a little dull like socks. Have the students practice saying something nice even if they don't like the item. If you use the Social Thinking Curriculum, this can be a great time to work on the social fake. Next, have a discussion about how this might work at their own holiday celebrations. You can also have students share about gifts the students have received in the past that were not their favorites. I also did a similar activity with students with early communication skills, most of whom used a combination of AAC and verbalizations. In that group, we practiced saying thank you in the way that would most likely be used at home during the holidays, whether that was AAC, verbally, or with sign language. RELATED: Winter Speech Therapy Activities Christmas Coloring Following Directions Activity Coloring is so motivating for some students. (And it can be a calming activity bonus!) For early communicators, you can work on holiday vocabulary, requesting colors, and expanding utterances. You can pair this with any simple holiday-themed coloring page I like to check out the Dollar Tree for coloring books. For students who are working on following directions goals, you can use Christmas coloring sheets paired with directions at their skill level. If you want a print-and-go version of Christmas coloring pages and directions, you can check it out here. RELATED: Following Directions Coloring Activities (plus a freebie) Christmas Category Sorting Work on Christmas vocabulary and categorization skills with this Christmas sorting activity. You can use sorting mats or print-and-go worksheets. Christmas-Themed Categories Included: toys Christmas sweets Christmas Activities Clothes Christmas characters things at the North Pole things made of snow decorating baking cookies wrapping building a snowman making a gingerbread house Christmas Favorite Things Activity Who doesn't love talking about their favorite things? I like this holiday-themed booklet because it is errorless and focuses on sharing opinions. (Just because there are no right answers, doesn't mean there aren't tons of opportunities to practice language skills like social skills, holiday vocabulary, turn taking, etc.) This Christmas Favorite Things booklet (also has a holiday version!) is a fun activity that encourages sharing opinions with peers for students who benefit from visual choices. (Plus, it can be differentiated, making it perfect for speech groups!) In this Christmas speech and language activity, students fill in five pages about their favorite holiday things (i.e. Holiday activity, treat, character, decorations, etc.) by gluing in a picture or by writing and drawing. Some students might be generating their own ideas while others are using visual choices. They can share their answers with the group or compare with a friend. Christmas Bingo with a Language Twist Games are always a fun way to celebrate an upcoming holiday while still getting tons of work done! This Christmas Language BINGO game can work for 1:1 sessions, small groups, or whole class push-ins. You can choose whether you focus on Christmas vocab (kind of like playing Zingo with a Christmas theme), riddles/inferences, or WH- questions. There is even an option to print black & white boards that students can color in to mark their spaces. The two-step directions calling cards are made to go with these black & white boards. You can find Christmas Language Bingo here. Speech Therapy Cooking Activities Cooking is always a fun group speech therapy activity (or for a speech/OT SPOT group)! This is especially popular to do with students in a life-skills program or with students in a substantially separate classroom where you'll have access to an oven and a refrigerator. Cooking is an important part of the Christmas tradition, and there are plenty of simple recipes for the holiday. You can use a visual recipe to make the steps more accessible for students who benefit from the use of visuals like this Banana Buddies Visual Recipe or Cranberry Orange Muffins Recipe. In a cooking group, you can target turn-taking, following directions, sequencing, requesting, and so much more! Cooking is also great for sensory input: smells, textures, temperatures, etc., and for teaching vocabulary related to those senses! Make a fun snowball toss game using a white lunch bag, construction paper, cotton balls, and a pipe cleaner. I cut the bag in half, then glued on a snowman head and pipe cleaner stick arms. Make sure to tape it to the table, because he does get a little top heavy if not! Use this as a reinforcer for a variety of goals. My students LOVED this easy to create and inexpensive activity! If you have a magnetic wand and chips, make a construction paper wreath and spread the chips all over it for a very simple- but motivating- way to get your students participating! Until next time, Christmas is jolly. It's also hectic and exhausting. There are schedule changes, special holiday programs, progress reports, and evaluations to wrap up you get the picture. So how to staymerry? I say keep it simple and go no-prep. (Or at least low-prep!) No-prep activities can include printables, but also books, games, simple crafts, digital activities, YouTube videos, and more. Head to the library or your bookshelf for your favorite Christmas stories. There are so many great Christmas titles out there for children. Read the book and practice articulation words as you find them. Talk about the story and characters, answer wh questions you know what to do! Books are a goldmine of opportunities for speech and language practice. Tip: Check your favorites out of the library early, or you may have trouble finding them! If you can't find a copy, search to see if there is a good read-aloud on YouTube. You'll want to preview the YouTube videos because some are great, and well others aren't. Pick a video that shows you the pages of the book. Look for one without camera shake and one where the narrator reads well, but not too fast. Tip: If the narration is too fast or not very expressive, you can turn off the volume and read it yourself. Doing this also gives you the opportunity to pause and discuss the vocabulary, plot, and characters and make predictions about what you think will happen next. A few favorites you can find on YouTube: A few fun Christmas games are sure to get your students excited to participate! Of course, you want to get in plenty of practice on goals too. How do you do that? The trick is to keep control of the game items, whether it's dice, balls, cards or game pieces. Don't let the students handle them until it's time to take a turn or your session may dissolve into pandemonium! (Oh yeah, I've been there.) To maximize practice opportunities, get multiple repetitions before each turn. This could look like asking 5 questions or requiring 10 repetitions of an articulation word each time. In groups, I prefer to maintain focus on goals by having everyone practice their goal and then give all the students a turn to play. Alternatively, you can drill goals for the bulk of your session, then spend the last 5 minutes playing the game as a fun reward. Bonus- If your students can play the game independently, that gives you 5 minutes to record data and write therapy notes! Play this fun Santa Cup knockdown game in speech therapy. Okay, I realize that adding the belt and buckle to the cups (The red ones above were painted) is a bit of prep, but it's not required. Your kids will have just as much fun stacking red and green cups in a pattern. Use styrofoam balls to toss or bowl with. If you don't have styrofoam balls, even wadded-up paper will work. During your session have students answer a question, then give them a cup to stack. When they're all stacked, you knock em down. Turn the cups open-side up, get out some cotton balls, and toss. For more fun, mark the cups with point values. Students earn cotton balls for answers. Or if you don't mind a bit of noise, use jingle bells to toss instead! Grab two colors of jingle bells, draw a quick tic-tac-toe grid and you are set. Make this easy candy cane craft with a pipe cleaner and beads! If you want to send home a tree ornament, try this Pony Bead Candy Cane. You'll need a pipe cleaner and red and white beads. Each response gets a bead or two to add to their pipe cleaner. You can also work on requesting: I need a red bead, please. Decorate this play dough Christmas tree with beads.
